CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: A practical course which examines the characteristics of quality programs for infants and toddlers and explores programming techniques which respond to individual and group needs of children up to 36 months of age. The focus of this course is on developing an awareness of the critical importance of care and interaction in the lives of infants and toddlers.
