A study of essays, short stories, drama, poetry, and a novel, which focuses on comprehension and writing skills associated with these genres. Strategies for academic research essays and literary essays will also be studied.

Course Content and Objectives

Academic Essay Unit: Upon completion of the unit, the student shall be able to

 use skimming, scanning, and reading from context, to identify the thesis and major support of an essay.

2 summarize and paraphrase readings.

- compose an essay using brainstorming, questioning, selecting, organizing, and outlining.
- identify in reading and use in writing, various patterns of organization used in essays. (example, process, comparison/contrast, analogy, classification, cause/effect, description, narration, and argument/persuasion.
- research, organize, and present a research paper using MLA documention and format.

Short Fiction Unit: Upon completion of the unit, the student shall be able to

- respond to readings by identifying, analyzing, and discussing various elements of short fiction.
- discuss and write about authors' style, technique, and point of view in various thematic treatments.

Novel Unit: Upon completion of the unit, the student shall be able to

- identify and explain the author's point of view through class discussion or writing.
- respond personally to social issues presented in the novel through an essay or class discussion.
- analyze, compare, and contrast character development as found in the selected novel.

Drama Unit: Upon completion of the unit, the student shall be able to

- identify characteristics of Shakespearean literature as seen in the play Othello.
- with the aid of reading, viewing, and discussing, interpret Shakespearian prose by writing paraphrases of selected material.

memorize and recite a selected soliloquy from Othello.

- analyze motivation and character development and its effect on plot in a selected modern play or a Shakespearean play.
- discuss the effect of setting and characterization on plot development and theme in either Shakespearian or modern drama selections.

Poetry Unit: Upon completion of the unit, the student shall be able to

- analyze, interpret, and discuss the elements of poetry found in selected readings and viewing.
- analyze and support points of view of selected poetry in written form.
