### **Course Objectives**

This is an introduction to the study of human individuality, personality and social processes. Some aspects of normal and abnormal human behaviour, psychological assessment and treatment will be included.

First, we will discuss developmental psychology, from birth to death (chapters 10 and 11). Next, we will talk about the nature of intelligence and how it has been assessed (chapter 12). Then, we will cover social psychology, talking about things such as conformity, prejudice, and gender issues (chapters 13 and 14). Theories of personality will also be examined (chapter 14). In the last part of the class, we will talk about psychological disorders (chapter 16), treatment (chapter 17), and psychological health (chapter 18). This course is designed to expose you to established psychological research findings and to help prepare you to be evaluate new, cutting-edge research that they may encounter in the media.

For all quizzes and exams, you will be responsible for both classroom and textbook material.

The quizzes will consist 15-20 multiple choice questions per chapter. They will be held during the first 20-30 minutes of class on the dates outlined on the lecture schedule.

The midterm exam and final exam will consist of multiple choice questions (15-20 multiple choice questions for each of the chapters) and short-answer questions (1 short-answer question for each of the chapters). The final exam will not be cumulative.

**Quizzes that are missed due to absence will *not* be rescheduled.** If a student misses a quiz due to verifiable illness, dentistry, accident, or emergency, the weight of the quiz will be placed on the final exam. Deferred writing of a scheduled Midterm Exam is at the discretion of the instructor. Absences from a registrar-scheduled Final Exam fall under GPRC Examination Policy. Missing any exam without explanation from the student will result in a zero on that exam. It is the responsibility of the student to be informed about these policies prior to the final examination period. A description of the policy is available in the GPRC Calendar and in the Student Handbook.

**Class Participation.** Class participation credit will be given for participation in class discussion, either by raising relevant questions, addressing questions raised in class (i.e., offering one's opinion or experiences related to the topics brought up in class), and/or by doing optional assignments that will be given throughout the term. Students should be aware that they are expected to meet their academic responsibility to attend classes. Attendance will be taken at all classes. According to GPRC policy, the instructor reserves the right to debar a student from writing the final exam when the student has accumulated more than 10% (2-3 classes) unexcused absences. Absences will be excused on the basis of verifiable illness, dentistry, accident, or emergency. In addition, students should not make plans for travel, holidays, employment etc. which will interfere with their writing of exams during any scheduled examination time.

**Bonus Media Assignment.** The media assignment will involve locating two reports of psychological research reported in the media (TV, news papers, magazines, internet) and providing an evaluation of the research in terms of the methods used and conclusions drawn. Each assignment is worth 2.5%. I will provide sample news reports and evaluations.
